# About ASCC

The Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC) is an organization whose objective is to form friendship links between the Atlanta community and similar jurisdictions in other countries so that citizens can express their goodwill and common desire for friendship and the development of understanding through a variety of mutually beneficial programs.

The ASCC encourages the participation of a cross-section of citizens in the development of international relationships.

ASCC manages the process of developing Atlanta's sister city affiliations, and establishes and supports a sister city committee for each recognized link.

ASCC has a vigorous program of exchange activities with its sister cities, including educational programs, cultural exchanges, philanthropy, economic development and social development.

ASCC members' programs have been recognized by Sister Cities International and awarded for their community outreach, economic and educational development.



Atlanta's sister cities activities contribute to the local economy through business and trade, tourism, education, and cultural programs.

Today, the ASCC oversees Atlanta's 17 sister city relationships and aims to increase the knowledge, goodwill, and understanding of the world through people-to-people diplomacy and exchanges.

It provides a platform for Atlantans to explore different cultures, expand academic opportunities, drive trade and investment, assist those in need, and ultimately raise Atlanta's visibility in the global community.

Through these strategic relationships, companies such as Sage North America and NurnbergMesse selected Atlanta for their North American operations; Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport expanded its global connectivity to Belgium, Nigeria, Jamaica, and the Dominican Republic; Georgia Tech established global campuses in France and China; more than \$80 million of medical supplies and services have been donated to treat more than 50,000 patients in Jamaica; and more than 300,000 people visit the Atlanta Christkindl Market and enjoy the rich German culture each year.

Through these programs, and many others, Atlanta's sister cities activities contribute nearly \$100 million to the local economy through business and trade, tourism, education, and cultural programs.


### Chairman's Letter

I am pleased to submit to you the 2020 Annual Report of the Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC). In addition to the activities of the various committees, ASCC carries out its role and function in relation to Atlanta's Sister Cities program.

We were pleased to serve the City of Atlanta and its international community during 2020 and look forward to the continued growth and expansion of the Sister Cities program under your administration.



The Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC) was chartered by the City of Atlanta and codified in Atlanta City Ordinance No. 1979-71. The organization is managed by a Chair appointed by the Mayor of Atlanta and ratified by a majority of the Atlanta City Council.

The full 'board' of the Commission comprises the Chair, three additional Mayoral appointees and two members appointed by the City Council. In addition, the chairpersons of each Sister City Committee, or their designee, serve on the Commission.

Elections are held annually to select a Vice Chair, a Secretary and a Treasurer. Each elected officer serves a one-year term. Elected officials of the Commission are restricted to two consecutive terms in office.

The Commission is supported by members of the Mayor's Office staff who participate in monthly and special meetings, help shape the Commission's policy and act as liaison with the Mayor.

ASCC maintains a web site with annual reports, information on each of the sister cities and details of the process of becoming a sister city.

### 2020 Highlights

### Sister City Diplomacy & COVID-19 Virtual Summit

In an effort to stay connected with sister city partners and share best practices and challenges of navigating the COVID -19 pandemic, the Mayor's Office of International Affairs (MOIA), in conjunction with ASCC, organized in May the first virtual summit "Sister City Diplomacy & COVID-19: Looking Ahead to the New Normal".

Representatives of over 10 cities were in attendance including, Toulouse, France; Nuremberg, Germany; Taipei, Republic of China (Taiwan); Daegu, South Korea; Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; Lagos, Nigeria; Ra'anana, Israel; Newcastle upon Tyne, United Kingdom; and Port of Spain, Trinidad and Tobago.

The event was moderated by Paulina Guzman, Global Engagement Officer, who also serves as the liaison to the Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC) and its 17 sister cities.

Sister City representatives had the opportunity to share challenges they are facing with the current health crisis, and how they continue to engage in international diplomacy and promote cooperation among their communities.

One of the main areas of concern is how cities could transition back to 'normality' while still maintaining health and safety precautions. For example, Toulouse was able to reopen their nursery and primary schools, but classes are limited to 10 students. The City of Nuremberg reopened their hair salons under strict rules and safety stand-

ards established by the federal administration. Taipei focused on sanitation and disease prevention measures like disinfecting metro stations, carriages, and public equipment regularly. And Port-of-Spain continues to enforce social distancing practices in public areas like grocery stores, parks, airports, and beaches.

Beyond health and safety precautions, there has been an emphasis on equitable community engagement and leveraging resources across various disciplines. The City of Ra'anana has mobilized a network of young people who make phone calls to seniors and the elderly to offer resources and assistance as needed. Newcastle has leveraged universities and international partners to obtain information regarding successful public health standards and practices that are being implemented across the world. Daegu mentioned the donation of face masks to Wuhan (China), the first region to report COVID-19 cases. Lastly, Rio de Janeiro's representative suggested creating an alliance of sister cities for economic recovery best practices.


